What is the Medicare Part D Event?

- Open access event aimed to help Medicare Part D beneficiaries choose a plan that is the most appropriate for their specific needs
 - Started in 2008
 - Held during Open Enrollment Period (October 15-December 7)





What are the goals?

- Increase patient access
- Enhance student experience in patient care
- Provide health screenings
- Promote interprofessional collaboration

Mentor-Mentee Program

- A Microsoft form was created for students to sign up & share their interests to be matched with other students, in collaboration with ASHP, Rho Chi, PLS
- Mentor/mentee relationships were established between student pharmacists, 300+ people were reached through public relations, and 80+ students joined the program.
- Takeaway: encouraging building connections with other fellow students.
- Advice: We recommend performing a survey to evaluate the number students interested in participating to help you plan accordingly.
- As the mentor-mentee program was beneficial for students, we are continuing it for this academic year.



Student Pharmacist Writing Contest

- 3 different prompts were created for students to write and reflect upon. Our chapter designed a rubric and graded the submitted writing pieces anonymously to ensure that students were evaluated in a fair manner.
- 1st innovative writing competition for student pharmacists that encourages creative writing and critical thinking. Reached 500+ students & 15 students participated!
- Feedback from students: they enjoyed using creative writing skills and helped enhance students' critical thinking skills.
- Advice: Design a program that challenges students to get out of their comfort zone and utilize their creative writing skills.
- We plan to continue to create new prompts and encourage student pharmacists to write and advocate for the profession

APhA-ASP Student Pharmacist Writing Contest 1st Place Winner

What was your inspiration for applying to pharmacy school? How has your vision changed since you first started pharmacy school?

My inspiration for applying to pharmacy school has always been on the basis of wanting to help out patients who come see me. During high school, I had already been working in the healthcare field and knew that this was my calling. The pharmacy profession has always gravitated towards me, I thought knowing hundreds of drugs and their mechanisms is impressive, and my

October is American Pharmacist Month



- We interviewed professors & pharmacists on how their positions in the pharmacy profession have changed during COVID-19 and created an educational poster. This event was in collaboration with 15 organizations: Pharmacy Council, DIA, PDC, ACCP, NCPA, Rho Chi, LKS, HerbalRx, IPhO, MSLS, ASHP, ISPE, SNPhA, SASP & VetRx
- Advocated for the pharmacy profession, educated and answered questions from the public on the role of pharmacists during COVID-19.
 1000+ people were reached via social media, and 100+ people attended the event!
- This event highlighted professionalism, advocacy skills, meaningful connections, and communication skills.
- Advice: Reach out to other professional pharmacy organizations, share ideas and make connections!
- We will continue to advocate for the pharmacy profession!

Breathe Strong Workshop

- We invited an instructor to provide breathing techniques. Collaborated with 25 organizations to encourage mental health awareness activities for students.
- Students learned breathing & meditation techniques to help with anxiety during finals, overcome sleeplessness and depression. 2754+ people were reached via social media, and 270+ students attended!
- Take care of yourself when it comes to stress and mental well-being. Learn how to breathe and meditate into their lives.
- Advice: Host this event around stressful times, such as midterms and finals week.
- This workshop has already been incorporated into the 2022-2023 academic school year!
- We will continue to advocate and provide support to all students who may be experiencing stressful times.



MA Pharmacist Provider Status



- MA Senate & House passed legislation that recognized pharmacists as healthcare providers. We invited 5 pharmacist panelists to discuss provider status, how it affects pharmacy practice, and what pharmacists and student pharmacists can do to advocate for the profession.
- We collaborated with APhA-ASP chapters at MCPHS Worcester, Northeastern and Western New England university, ASHP and NCPA chapters. We reached 2500+ people on social media, and 150+ students & 18 pharmacists from 4 universities attend the event.
- Students learned about the growing profession of pharmacy, the impact of pharmacists in healthcare, and how to advocate for one another in this field.
- Advice: Invite guest speakers that recognize, understand, and have been proactive on how important it is for pharmacists to have a voice in healthcare.
- Making students aware of the growing profession can further enhance other generations to come. Change and advocacy for the pharmacy career starts with us and that is something we will always make others aware of!

Mobius Project: Health + Wellness Series

Washington State University College of Pharmacy & Pharmaceutical Sciences

Description

- Health + Wellness series was a month-long project that took place every Saturday in February 2022.
- We partnered with the local children's science center, Mobius Discovery, in Spokane, WA to educate kids about how to stay healthy in their daily lives.
- Led by our Patient Care VP
 Olivia Hiskey, our Operation
 Chairs designed fun and
 interactive activities to help
 engage the kids for the lessons.





Goals

- Utilize our role as clinicians to encourage and provide education to local children and families on how to live healthy lifestyles.
- Outside of our Operation Immunization clinics, this project was one of our first opportunities to participate in community outreach again.
- Chapter leaders were motivated to develop a project that would capture attention within the community as well as the student body.
- On top of enjoying the activities with the kids, our volunteers got the chance to practice their clinical counseling skills with the kids and their families.



Breakdown

- Every Saturday, a different theme was chosen and led by a team of Operation Chairs from our chapter.
 - Week 1 Blood Sugar
 - "Sneaky Sugars" guessing game
 - MyPlate foods activity
 - Week 2 Vitals/Hand Hygiene
 - Glo-germ hand-washing
 - Build-your-own-sthethoscope activity
 - Week 3 Heart & Lungs
 - Heart chambers/blood pumping model
 - Build-your-own-lung model
 - Week 4 What's in the Blood?
 - Blood sensory chamber
 - What's my blood type? Activity
- Budget
 - ~\$100





Timeline

- October 2021
 - First contact with site manager at Mobius Discovery Center, discussed possibility of collaboration with WSU pharmacy program.
- November 2021
 - Patient Care VP worked with Operation Chairs to delegate responsibilities and who will be leading each week's theme.
- December 2021
 - Follow-up meeting with Mobius site manager, finalized each week's activities.
 - Provided activity descriptions to include in social media and newsletter promotions.
 - Provided comprehensive supply list to distinguish what could be provided by center and what we would have to purchase on our own.
- January 2022
 - Supplies ordered and preparation began for test runs with activities.
- February 2022
 - Fun with the kids!



Impact

- Reached 35-50 children and families over 2-hour intervals each day.
- Primary demographic was age 6-10 year olds.



Future/Planning

- Mobius Project coming back in 2023!
- Bringing back old and new ideas
 - Themes
 - Germs and Hand-hygiene
 - Tooth and Dental Health
 - "Super Kidneys"
 - Heart & Blood
- What worked well?
 - Activities that were more interactive worked best for keeping the kids attention during the activities.
 - Received excellent feedback from all volunteers and community members that participated
 - Asked back to participate again in 2023.
 - Looking to turn project into annual chapter tradition.
- What could be improved?
 - Giving more prep time for the volunteers.
 - Providing tips to volunteers for communication with the kids and how to break down concepts.
 - Be prepared to answer more advanced clinical questions from parents.

 - Nearly 500 health screenings provided

- Meet 60% membership goal by October 1st
- Surpass individual chapter membership goal by 30%

- Make a personal connection with as many fellow student pharmacists as you can on your campus
- Competition between classes or groups is the greatest motivator

Future Ideas

- Further incorporate professors and advisors in informal settings to promote inclusivity and a welcoming atmosphere
- Expand collaborative efforts with pharmacy organizations to include Phi Lambda Sigma and Rho Chi
- Broaden one event during the week to a larger student population to showcase SCAPP and our mission to non-pharmacy students



- Supported by faculty and staff






Goals

- Encourage student pharmacists to explore their passions in serving their community








- Nearly 200 student pharmacists participated in 2021




