

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# Year in COVID-19 • January–June





The first U.S. case of COVID-19 was confirmed on January 21.

APhA's Pharmacists' Guide to Coronavirus at pharmacist.com/ coronavirus launched February 27, an effort sparked by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) warning 2 days earlier that COVID-19 was likely to spread in communities throughout the United States, and that Americans should be prepared for significant disruption to their lives.

Our webpages soon housed APhA's COVID-19 resources. The 15 on COVID-19 series of CPE episodes started March 23, the Addressing the COVID-19 Crisis: An Open Forum Webinar Series for Pharmacists began March 26, and the first Know the Facts practice resources were posted March 30.

APhA ramped up development, review, and production of COVID-19 resources at an astounding pace in the spring and throughout 2020.

The Pharmacists' Guide to Coronavirus webpages evolved into a dependable, accessible portal to information supporting the profession's ability to maintain continuity of care and play an active role in the fight against coronavirus.

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On March 11, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared COVID-19 a pandemic, and the 2020 APhA Annual Meeting & Exposition in National Harbor, MD, was canceled. Remote work for most APhA staff began on March 23.





In direct response to APhA's comment letter on April 1 addressing concerns that pharmacists and pharmacy personnel continue to serve without proper protection and social distancing from patients, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) issued a COVID-19 guidance for community pharmacies that included pharmacy-specific tips to help reduce the risk of exposure to coronavirus.

U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) guidance on April 8 authorized pharmacists to order and administer COVID-19 tests. On May 19, an HHS advisory opinion clarified pharmacists can test for COVID-19 in all states.



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# July-December • Year in COVID-19



On August 19, HHS removed state barriers to pharmacist provision of childhood vaccines during the pandemic emergency. On September 9, HHS authorized pharmacists and pharmacy interns to administer COVID-19 vaccines. Such tremendous news didn't happen on its own. APhA led a coalition of pharmacy organizations to argue that pharmacists serve a vital role in the nation's response to this pandemic.



During COVID-19, it's more important than ever for patients to receive the influenza vaccine. In September, APhA CEO Scott Knoer visited The Neighborhood Pharmacy in the Del Ray neighborhood of Alexandria, VA, and rolled up his sleeve for a flu shot. During American Pharmacists Month, pharmacists and pharmacy professionals were saluted for the role we're playing to address this pandemic. This year's theme resonated with these unprecedented times:

"Essential Providers. Accessible Care."



On October 16, HHS announced agreements for early-phase COVID-19 vaccine administration to residents of longterm care facilities (LTCFs) nationwide. On November 12, HHS announced more chain and independent pharmacies across the country would get a direct allocation of COVID-19 vaccine from the federal government.

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# About APhA

The American Pharmacists Association (APhA) is the first-established, largest, and most diverse national professional association representing practicing pharmacists, pharmaceutical scientists, student pharmacists, and pharmacy technicians in all practice settings. Nearly all of pharmacy's specialty organizations trace their roots to APhA, which was founded in 1852 as the American Pharmaceutical Association.

# **How APhA Works**

The APhA Board of Trustees is responsible for broad direction setting of the Association and development of APhA's Vision and Mission statements and the Strategic Plan.

Policy for APhA—and the profession of pharmacy as a whole—is developed by the APhA House of Delegates. Comprised of delegates from state pharmacy associations, APhA's three membership Academies, affiliated organizations, recognized pharmacy organizations, and ex-officio groups, the House met virtually twice in 2020 to debate and adopt proposed contemporary policy statements to guide the Association and profession.

Day-to-day activities of 120 dedicated APhA professional staff are led by APhA Executive Vice President and CEO Scott J. Knoer, MS, PharmD, FASHP, and the senior management team.

# **Connecting Through APhA**

APhA members belong to one of three Academies:

- » Practitioners in community, hospital, and more specialized areas belong to the APhA Academy of Pharmacy Practice & Management (APhA-APPM).
- Scientists conducting research in pharmaceutical, clinical, academic, economic, and other areas of research belong to the APhA Academy of Pharmaceutical Research & Science (APhA-APRS).
- » Student pharmacists who are enrolled in a program at an accredited school of pharmacy belong to the APhA Academy of Student Pharmacists (APhA-ASP).

# Advocacy for the Profession

As COVID-19 engulfed the globe in 2020, APhA members met the virus crisis head on as essential health care providers in pharmacies and other settings across America. APhA led and collaborated on visionary advocacy for the profession, resulting in the federal government's expansion of patient access to pharmacists' services and elevation of the important roles of pharmacists and pharmacy professionals during the pandemic.

Collaboration among the national pharmacy organizations has never been stronger, and APhA has led the way to leverage pharmacists' strength in numbers.

On March 20, APhA and other pharmacy organizations released "Pharmacists as Front-Line Responders for COVID-19 Patient Care," a joint set of policy recommendations in *four areas.* 

# Expanding Access to Immunizations

APhA's more than 25 years of leadership and engagement in immunizations positioned the profession for recognition with major wins for pharmacists, pharmacy interns, and pharmacy technicians during the COVID-19 public health emergency.

HHS <u>authorized</u> pharmacists on August 19 to provide all CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP)-recommended vaccines to children aged 3-18 years nationwide during the public health emergency. APhA, along with other national pharmacy organizations, had <u>advocated</u> to HHS to provide this authority.

APhA also joined pharmacy organizations to <u>urge</u> HHS to increase adult vaccination and distribution.

On September 9, HHS similarly <u>authorized</u> pharmacists to order and administer—and pharmacy interns to administer—COVID-19 vaccines to everyone aged 3 years or older.

On October 20, HHS temporarily <u>authorized</u> and granted liability coverage to both "qualified" pharmacy technicians and pharmacy interns to administer childhood vaccines and FDA-authorized or licensed COVID-19 vaccines and tests to everyone aged 3 years and older, under the supervision of an immunizing pharmacist.

According to an APhA nationwide <u>survey</u> of 400 pharmacists released December 2, more than three-quarters of pharmacists said they planned to be vaccinated with one of the COVID-19 vaccines, and 60% said they would be set up and ready to vaccinate patients as soon as the vaccine is available. Compared with results from our September survey, more pharmacists were willing to get and administer the COVID vaccine.



# **IN 2020,** THE APhA-PAC GENERATED OVER \$100,000 FOR THE THIRD YEAR RUNNING.

- APhA-PAC support was split
  **50/50** between Democrats and Republicans in the <u>2019-2020</u> <u>election cycle.</u>
- » Over 90% of APhA-PAC supported federal candidates won their 2020 election campaigns that were decided by the end of the year.
- APhA members in all 50 states plus Puerto Rico and the District of Columbia supported the PAC in 2020.
- The annual Back the PAC campaign and the SIG PAC Challenge each raised over
   \$30,000 from APhA members for the nonpartisan APhA-PAC.
- \$150 is the most common contribution amount to the APhA-PAC.
- » APhA Government Affairs staff met with over 40 challenger or open-seat federal candidates for the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate.

# **Expanding Access to Testing**

In 2020, HHS authorized pharmacists, pharmacy interns, and technicians to conduct COVID-19 testing during the public health emergency. APhA worked with government officials at state and national level to ensure access and payment for pharmacists.

On April 8, HHS <u>authorized</u> pharmacists to order and administer FDA-authorized COVID-19 tests. On May 19, HHS *clarified* pharmacists could test for COVID-19 in all states. The October 20 HHS <u>guidance</u> additionally authorized pharmacy technicians and pharmacy interns to administer FDA-authorized COVID-19 tests, including serology tests. Only pharmacists, not technicians or interns, can order the test.

# The Push for Provider Status

APhA's efforts to increase patient access to and coverage for pharmacists' patient care services, or "provider status," this year were largely tied to the profession's COVID-19 response as a push for payment for testing and immunizations.

Support grew for provider status authorization for COVID-19 and influenza testing and vaccinations. To that end, in August, over 30 patient, physician, and diverse health care groups, representing more than 200 million patients, <u>signed on to</u> a National Forum for Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention coalition open letter to Congress and White House. The letter shared their positive experiences with pharmacists' services to advocate for inclusion in COVID-19 legislation.

APhA's tireless efforts on Capitol Hill did not result in legislation; however, advances in authority and payment for pharmacists' services were secured through regulatory means during the public health emergency.

# Additional Wins During COVID-19

During COVID-19, APhA fought for pharmacists' and pharmacy team members' safety and work conditions. We worked with federal government agencies, health plans, and pharmacies to ensure that safety measures like safe distances, delivery, and signature alternatives were in place.

APhA advocated for CDC and HHS to issue guidance for pharmacists and pharmacies to maintain continuity of care for patients and to recognize pharmacists and pharmacy professionals as essential health care workers.

The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine included <u>APhA's recommendations</u> to prioritize vaccinating pharmacists as Phase 1a in new COVID-19 vaccine allocation in an influential <u>final report</u> delivered October 2. The report called for a prominent role for pharmacies in the distribution of vaccines to the public.

APhA congratulates pharmacists and APhA members Rep. Buddy Carter (R-GA) on his reelection and Rep.-elect Diana Harshbarger (R-TN) on her election to the U.S. House of Representatives. We welcome them, as well as pharmacy owner Rep. Jerry Carl (R-AL) and all incoming members of the 117th Congress.

# Supreme Court Victory for Pharmacy

On December 10, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously <u>ruled</u> 8–0, in <u>Rutledge v. Pharmaceutical</u> Care Management Association (PCMA), that an Arkansas law, which prohibits PBMs from reimbursing pharmacies at a lower rate than what the pharmacies pay to fill prescriptions, is valid and not preempted by the Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA).

The oral arguments were heard October 6 after a pandemic-related delay. <u>APhA</u>—along with the National Community Pharmacists Association (NCPA), Arkansas Pharmacists Association (APA), the National Alliance of State Pharmacy Associations (NASPA), and other pharmacy organizations—had filed an eloquent "friend of the court" *brief*, arguing that PBMs' below-cost reimbursements had led to the closures of independent rural pharmacies. We were glad to support the effort led by APA and NCPA.

APhA CEO Scott Knoer wrote to our members about the victory: "First, it brings transparency to the business practices of PBMs and holds them more accountable for their actions. Second, it sets a clear blueprint for states to follow as they pursue oversight and regulation of PBMs. If states follow, pharmacy wins across the country, not just in Arkansas. Third, it's a ray of hope for community pharmacies, which have long been struggling to remain viable while PBMs did their damage almost wholly unchecked."

### APhA Battles Drug Importation Program

FDA issued a *final rule* and *final guidance* to implement and facilitate two new pathways for the legal importation of certain drugs. Effective November 30, the final rule authorizes states and tribes—and, eventually, identified wholesalers and pharmacists—to submit proposals outlining plans to import certain types of prescription drugs from Canada.

We <u>fought</u> the proposed rule, published in December 2019. We submitted <u>APhA's comments</u> and collaborated on <u>joint comments</u> with colleague pharmacy organizations, and facilitated comments from individual pharmacists who shared their concerns with FDA. APhA believes that FDA's drug importation program jeopardizes patient safety by creating supply chain vulnerabilities that could potentially introduce counterfeit or unsafe drugs into the United States, without any potential cost savings.

### Collaborating to Impact Patient Care

During COVID-19, we collaborated with other stakeholders to address challenges and opportunities. We engaged with the National Alliance of State Pharmacy Associations (NASPA) and other pharmacy organizations to address patient care issues related to continuity of care, telehealth, testing, vaccination, and other mitigation activities by pharmacists.

With the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO) and 23 other organizations, we formed the Leadership Council on COVID-19 Vaccination Planning and Campaign. APhA cochairs the council's work on many topics related to the vaccine rollout. In late 2020, this collaboration attracted the attention of Presidentelect Joe Biden's COVID-19 advisory board.

Pharmacy representation on coalitions is instrumental in influencing and educating key stakeholders on the impact pharmacists can have on patient health. APhA participates in various coalitions, such as the Million Hearts initiative, the National Academy of Medicine Action Collaborative on

Countering the U.S. Opioid Epidemic, CDC PROTECT, and numerous immunization coalitions.

APhA also works with our colleague pharmacy organizations and actively engages in pharmacy-related organizations, such as the Joint Commission of Pharmacy Practitioners (JCPP), Council on Credentialing in Pharmacy, Pharmacy Quality Alliance (PQA), Pharmacy HIT Collaborative, National Council for Prescription Drug Programs (NCPDP), and International Pharmaceutical Federation (FIP).

On October 7, the U.S. Surgeon General issued a <u>comprehensive</u> report on hypertension control, stating,

"Doctors, nurses, and pharmacists have a critical role to play" in controlling hypertension. APhA actively participates in CDC's National Hypertension Control Roundtable to implement the recommendations in the Surgeon General's report, including involvement of pharmacists in hypertension services. Resources that support the pharmacists'

role in controlling hypertension can be found at *pharmacist.com/hypertension*.

### Media: A Greater Role on the Public Stage

APhA expanded its voice and reach in the news media this year by most objective measures, ensuring that ours remains a dominant voice in pharmacy. Throughout the year, and particularly as the COVID-19 pandemic raged, APhA leaders wrote op-eds and commentaries with mainstream news organizations and influential digital news outlets and appeared on national TV news networks.

We achieved significant media attention in 2020, including 4,543 media mentions. For example, *Modern Healthcare* published a September 28 cover story, "At the Center of a 'Care Revolution': Pharmacists in Ohio Managing Care as Providers—and Getting Paid for It Too," that quoted APhA's Anne Burns and Antonio Ciaccia.

To complement American Pharmacists Month in October and reach a wider public audience, APhA partnered with Tabula Rasa Healthcare on a campaign called "Medication Safety Starts with a Pharmacist." It educated patients about adverse drug events and pharmacists' role in medication safety.

### Protecting and Improving Well-Being

You're committed to pharmacy. We're committed to your well-being.

By the end of the year, more than 7,100 pharmacists, student pharmacists, and pharmacy technicians had assessed and tracked their well-being with the Pharmacy Well-Being Index (WBI), a validated screening tool offered by APhA and invented by the Mayo Clinic.

In 2020, we further expanded *pharmacist.com/well-being* into pharmacy's one-stop place for all of APhA's well-being and resilience resources, including access to the WBI.

APhA prepared a monthly WBI State of the States Report for the state pharmacy associations. The data tracked the distress percent for each state and compared it with national and regional data. The data showed that where you live may play a part in your risk for high distress. This year, assessors living in Louisiana had the highest percent of those at risk for high distress (51.90%). The lowest risk fluctuated among Washington, DC, Wyoming, and most recently, South Carolina (20.87%). The national average risk for distress in 2020 was 32.89%.

The Journal of the American Pharmacists Association continued to publish peer-reviewed research articles on <u>well-being</u> and <u>workplace</u> issues. And the June issue of APhA's Pharmacy Today magazine <u>delved</u> into resilience in the face of workplace stress.

Each Well-Being Wednesday, APhA offered a well-being tip for pharmacy personnel—from gratitude to laughter to the importance of sleep.



### **Addressing Racism and Sexism**

The <u>APhA Task Force on Structural</u> <u>Racism in Pharmacy</u>, announced in June, made steady progress towards fulfilling its charge to advise APhA on addressing structural racism, especially in the areas of organization culture, governance, and pharmacist education. Also announced was a related <u>campaign</u> to raise awareness of a joint statement <u>issued</u> earlier by APhA and 12 other national pharmacy organizations.

Chaired by APhA Trustee-elect Andrew Gentles, PharmD, BCPS-AQ, ID, the task force comprises a diverse, influential complement of approximately 15 APhA members, leaders, and staff liaisons. On December 2, the task force held its first public event—a virtual town hall: <u>"Conversations about Racism in</u> <u>Pharmacy: Starting with Me."</u>

The APhA Board of Trustees *issued* a statement in September decrying sexual harassment and intimidation in pharmacy in response to a broadly circulated petition on Change.org calling on national pharmacy organizations to address the ways women are silenced.

# **Resources for Members**

With the emergence of the pandemic, APhA pivoted to focus on developing timely resources to help pharmacists meet the COVID-19 challenges and opportunities in their practices. These are posted on our Pharmacists' Guide to Coronavirus webpages at *pharmacist.com/coronavirus*.

# Meeting Needs for COVID-19 Information

Days after the pandemic was designated as such, APhA's <u>15 on</u> <u>COVID-19</u> series of CPE episodes kicked off on March 23. We designed the brief webinars to assist pharmacists and technicians in separating fact from fiction, and rumor from hypothesis, in the early days of the pandemic—when information and misinformation were in constant flux, and pharmacy staff were inundated with questions from their patients and the public.

To help pharmacists navigate changes in practice resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, APhA began the <u>Addressing</u> <u>the COVID-19 Crisis: An Open Forum</u> Webinar Series for Pharmacists on

March 26. This year, APhA President Michael Hogue moderated 35 webinars that highlighted the latest breaking information on COVID-19, followed by an interactive group discussion on topics such as safety, testing, vaccines, and more.

Starting on March 30, APhA produced and updated what now number over 30 <u>Know the Facts</u> practice resources on a wide variety of topics—from personal protective equipment to COVID-19 testing and vaccines. Experiences and feedback from pharmacists on the front lines helped inform us of the most pressing needs.



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# Providing Immunization Training

As we transitioned to virtual offerings, APhA worked through the logistics of assessing immunization technique. It was important for licensed partners and those previously trained in the program to review and document proper injection technique.

On June 29, APhA <u>announced</u> a collaboration with the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) to provide technician credentialing in immunization delivery to those completing the APhA/Washington State University (WSU) Pharmacy-Based Immunization Administration by Pharmacy Technicians <u>program</u>. We trained more than 10,000 technicians to immunize through the program in the last 3 months of 2020.

APhA announced the new Pharmacybased Immunizations for Pediatric Patients program in partnership with WSU College of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences on October 1. The program prepares state-licensed immunizing pharmacists to meet the education requirements to administer vaccinations to children aged 3-18 years, in compliance with new HHS guidelines during COVID-19.



As of December 31, 2020, **more than 376,000 pharmacists** have been trained to administer vaccines across the lifespan.

# Advancing Pharmacists' Patient Care Services

Apart from work related to COVID-19, APhA created additional resources to advance pharmacists' patient care services. Aligned with the Surgeon General's Report on Smoking Cessation released in January, APhA produced *"Promising Practices for Pharmacist Engagement in Tobacco Cessation Interventions,"* a tobacco cessation resource with case studies that focus on implementation and sustainability factors for implementing pharmacistprovided tobacco cessation services.

Value-based payment models continued to grow. Pharmacists

now can consult a new resource, <u>"Successful Integration of Pharmacists</u> <u>in Accountable Care Organizations and</u> <u>Medical Home Models: Case Studies,"</u> that contains case studies highlighting how practices got started, services offered, and how pharmacists are financially sustained in these models. It was developed by the APhA Academy of Pharmacy Practice & Management Medical Home/ACO Special Interest Group.

As payment for pharmacists' patient care services expands, pharmacists will need to participate in credentialing processes with payers and their organizations. An APhA Practice Perspectives Report on "<u>Credentialing</u> in the Pharmacy Profession: An Overview of the Current Environment" highlighted the results of a survey on pharmacists' perceptions of credentialing processes.

# SUPPORTING COMMUNITY-BASED PHARMACY RESIDENCIES

APhA continued to support community-based pharmacy residency (CPRP) training by providing educational programs, networking opportunities, and information for residency program directors, preceptors, and residents. APhA partners with the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP) to accredit communitybased residency programs and represents and advocates for community-based programs in the accreditation program.

> In 2020, 179 postgraduate year (PGY)1 Community-Based Pharmacy Residency Programs offered training at 214 outpatient practice sites for 288 resident positions.

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# Educating Through Programs and Resources

With the support of corporate partners, APhA developed new training programs and resources in 2020, including:

We continued our monthly Hot Topic Webinar series. Our CDC ACIP webinars with immunization updates averaged over 500 attendees.

Last year, the Board of Pharmacy

Specialties (BPS) approved APhA to provide a professional development program for the recertification of Board-Certified Sterile Compounding Pharmacists (BCSCP). APhA is offering at least 45 hours of recertification credit per year from 2020 to 2022.

### Reimagining Our Website and Technology

In 2020, APhA implemented several high-priority website and technology initiatives to benefit online user experience and improve internal business processes. Visible to our members, we built the new government advocacy platform *pharmacist.com/* advocacy, launched and redesigned pharmacist.com/coronavirus.handcoded the APhA2020 Virtual conference site, launched an online membership renewal platform, and relaunched *PharmacyLibrary* with an upgraded design, user interface, and functionality. We also created and updated numerous *pharmacist.com* webpages on a wide variety of topics.

# **Connecting Members** to Valuable Resources

This year, APhA took a deep dive into how we share information and where we can improve to ensure APhA members receive the best, most relevant content. We updated our member newsletters with better design and writing, less repetition, and more targeted information. We now distribute the Legislative and Regulatory Update newsletter bimonthly with the latest from government agencies and Capitol Hill. We created two new email products: the COVID-19 newsletter and Breaking News. And we developed a new name and style for our weekly member newsletter, APhA This Week, to bring all things APhA to our members.

# APhA THIS WEEK

We also continued to refine our strategies for Facebook, LinkedIn, and Twitter. Our LinkedIn audience nearly doubled in 2020. Our social media fans love to hear about member success stories, the latest pharmacy news, and APhA's advocacy efforts.

*JPharmSci* appointment: Editor in Chief Ken Audus, PhD, of the University of Kansas, replaced Ron Borchardt, who served for 20 years as Editor in Chief of the *Journal of Pharmaceutical Sciences (JPharmSci)*.

**2.772 impact factor for JAPhA** (the Journal of the American Pharmacists Association) reflects an over 60% increase in the past 2 years. The impact factor reflects the relative importance of a journal within its field based on the number of times its articles are cited. Impact factors tend to change slowly, so JAPhA's increase is particularly notable.

**Digital-first** is the name of the game for APhA publishing, including our periodicals: *JAPhA*; *JPharmSci*; <u>Pharmacy Today</u>, our flagship newsmagazine and daily edition email; timely, original news articles for <u>pharmacist.com</u>; <u>Student</u> <u>Pharmacist Magazine</u>; and <u>Transitions</u>.



**Special issues** included cannabis and mental health in *JAPhA* and biopharmaceutical science and engineering in *JPharmSci*.

**COVID-19** was covered in 20 *JAPhA* articles, including a very early paper from pharmacists in Wuhan published online on April 9—and in every issue of *Pharmacy Today* starting in February, including a comprehensive timeline cover story in May and a year-end, wrap-up cover story in December. Our <u>COVID-19</u> <u>Module</u> became available free to anyone on PharmacotherapyFirst. And information on COVID-19 also was published in APhA's email newsletters.

**As a gift** for graduating APhA Academy of Student Pharmacists (APhA-ASP) members, we produced and sent the first *Transitions: New Grad Edition* magazine in July.

Locked on Pharmacy is APhA's podcast series on pharmacy topics. In 2020, we entered *into an agreement* with the Pharmacy Podcast Network to exclusively distribute our podcast. The first episode was published on October 1.





As COVID-19 changed everything in 2020, APhA rapidly developed innovative approaches to keep members connected to the profession and provide access to information, education, and resources.

Formally launched on May 28, APhA2020 Virtual was an amazing, first-of-its-kind effort by our staff to convert an all-live event into a meaningful digital event that honored the heroes of pharmacy and provided meaningful content to those who would have attended the meeting, as well as the rest of our membership. It included 100 hours of CPE; 53 education sessions, plus a keynote address, were recorded for delivery. Also included were APhA's award presentations, new policy updates from APhA's House of Delegates, and much more.



The APhA Federal Pharmacy Symposium, supported by Walgreens, focused on emergency preparedness planning and resilience for over 100 participants on October 8. We hosted our first all-virtual Joint Federal Pharmacy Seminar (JFPS) on November 13–14, with over 20 hours of CPE, as well as a virtual exhibit hall, poster gallery, and presentation theaters. APhA welcomed nearly as many attendees as at an in-person JFPS, and 55 exhibiting companies showcased the latest innovations in federal pharmacy.

# Inspiring Student Pharmacists and New Practitioners

Throughout the nation, colleges of pharmacy retooled their commencement exercises into virtual events. On May 8, APhA-ASP hosted the first APhA Grad Night via Facebook Live for more than 6,300 people. The special evening served as recognition of the hard work and achievements of the 2020 PharmD graduating class.

Hundreds of APhA-ASP chapter leaders gathered for several days of expert presentations and networking at the virtual APhA-ASP Summer Leadership Institute in August. And the APhA New Practitioner Network hosted a 3-night virtual meeting in October, replacing the annual live Day of NP LIFE, for 80 attendees. The APhA-ASP Midyear Regional Meetings were completely redesigned and delivered in November. Instead of hosting eight in-person regional meetings, we provided a single virtual Midyear Regional Meeting across 5 days of dynamic speakers, networking, a career showcase featuring more than 30 exhibitors, and, of course, a fun experience for nearly 1,900 attendees.

# Transforming Pharmacy with a New Energy

As the flagship organization for pharmacy in the United States and the Association committed to being inclusive of every practice setting, our members and nonmembers alike have always called upon us to champion their needs to government agencies, regulatory authorities, and other health care stakeholders. While 2020 and the accompanying pandemic presented many new challenges for the profession, it also created unique new opportunities for us to showcase our value. With bold new leadership, we intend to not only expand pharmacists' services. but to transparently communicate our advocacy to members, as well as prospective members.

For years, pharmacists have struggled with incredibly challenging work environments made worse by broken payment mechanisms and systems that prevent them from utilizing their full expertise to care for patients. While COVID-19 didn't make things easier, it provided an opportunity for pharmacists to prove their undeniable value in patient care. We used this momentum to take a bold and aggressive approach in our advocacy, appearing on multiple podcast and television interviews, speaking with legislators, and working with government agencies to fight for the everyday issues affecting our members the most—PBM and payment reform, value instead of volume, pharmacist provider status, and ability to optimally practice pharmacy.

The pandemic necessitated many strategic shifts and forced our organization to be nimble in meeting members where they are. Our primary goal became diligently supplying members with the latest COVID-19 information and education and equipping them with the tools and resources they needed to serve their patients, all in a digital format.

## Engaging Pharmacist Members Through the Academies

APhA-APPM's 11 Special Interest Groups (SIGs) included 465 volunteer committee positions. In 2020, the SIGs worked on 15 projects, developed 9 webinars for CPE and non-CPE, and launched a <u>universal form</u> for member recognition within each SIG.

In May, following a successful petition, APhA-APPM launched the Public Health SIG. Our newest SIG held a virtual networking activity, worked on a range of projects, and grew to over 2,100 members on our ENGAGE platform by year's end.

APhA's Academies undertook several 2020-2021 projects. APhA-APRS and the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (AACP) created a Task Force on Gender Equity in academic pharmacy.

Nurturing early-career members, APhA-APPM and APhA-APRS created a Task Force on Practice-Based Research to promote practice-based research tools and resources and guide APhA in efforts for novice pharmacist researchers.

The APhA-APRS Postgraduate Advisory Committee created a survey on workplace conditions and well-being for which results will be presented at APhA2021. And in December, the new APhA-APPM Pharmacy Residency Standing Committee launched to connect all pharmacy residents (years 1 and 2) and academic, nonacademic, and executive fellows seeking advanced training in pharmacy practice.

### Engaging Student Pharmacist Academy Members

APhA-ASP continued to make a difference. In 2019-2020, a total of 75,347 student pharmacists participated in the six APhA-ASP National Patient Care Projects, including Generation Rx (since renamed Operation Substance Use Disorders), Operation Diabetes, Operation Heart, Operation Immunization, OTC Medicine Safety, and the Women's Health Campaign.

APhA-ASP's Operation Substance Use Disorders launched in October through a collaboration with Walmart Inc. This educational program was inspired by the passion of student pharmacists and the needs of communities across the country.

As well, the National Patient Counseling Competition was conducted virtually, with a telehealth format, in March and April. The winning results were announced on May 1, during the last night of APhA-ASP Awards Week.

# Board of Pharmacy Specialties


As the demand for pharmacists who hold board certifications from the Board of Pharmacy Specialties (BPS) grows exponentially, BPS has experienced significant growth in the number of recognized specialty areas and the number of active board certifications issued.


By the end of 2020, more than 50,000 active BPS credentials were issued worldwide—an 8% increase over the past year that showcases the amazing growth in the breadth of specialized pharmacy practice and the pharmacy profession.

BPS board certification is tied to the growth in opportunities for pharmacist specialists around the globe. As of December 2020, there were 5,418 active BPS board-certified pharmacists outside of the United States, with at least one board certified pharmacist in more than 30 countries—a remarkable milestone that speaks to the global reach of BPS certification.

Emergency Medicine Pharmacy has been approved as the 14th BPS specialty. BPS also issued a call for panelists to participate in a role delineation study to begin exploration of Pain Management as a pharmacy specialty. The growth in the number of specialty areas responds to the evolution of pharmacy to a patientcentered practice.

In addition, BPS received accreditation under International Organization for Standardization (ISO) 17024 Accreditation Standards. Accreditation is a formal, independent verification where a program or institution meets established quality standards and is competent to carry out specific conformity assessment tasks. BPS is now one of a small number of organizations that holds accreditation across two sets of standards: National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA) and ISO 17024. This outstanding accomplishment speaks to BPS's commitment to managing a certification program that seeks to be a leader in the credentialing industry.

# APhA Foundation

Nationally and globally recognized, the APhA Foundation supports the strategic priorities of APhA and the profession—including efforts on patient care engagement and scope optimization, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Delivering Value Through Research and Innovation

In 2020, active research and innovation programs included work in the areas of diabetes prevention, cardiovascular health, immunizations, and contributions to individual and population health.

Project IMPACT: Diabetes Prevention is an opportunity to change the landscape of how the Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP) is delivered in communities across the country. Through a cooperative agreement with CDC in partnership with Kroger, SinfoníaRx, and Lark, this 5-year national program's unique model uses teams of lifestyle coaches, meets participants where they are, and supports participant success.

The CDC Foundation has collaborated with the APhA Foundation to design an innovative care model called Blood Pressure First (BP First). BP First is being implemented by employers seeking to control hypertension in their workforce. In June, the National Forum for Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention and 21 organizations representing patients, providers, public health, payers, and purchasers *issued* recommendations that would expand access to health care services from pharmacists, especially in underserved or otherwise vulnerable populations.

The APhA Foundation collaborated with the American Medical Association (AMA) on the new <u>Validated BP Device</u> <u>Listing</u> of blood pressure measurement devices that have been validated for clinical accuracy, as determined through an independent review process. It is now available to consumers and health care professionals.

Project IMPACT: Immunizations continued to address gaps in vaccination coverage that pose a significant risk to public health.

Work is under way that could lead to expanded patient care activities by pharmacists, supported by the launch of the IMPACT Care Transformation Network. The <u>IMPACT</u> <u>Care Transformation Institute</u> resources continued to provide online CPE modules, webinars, and active learning activities—with more to come in 2021.

# **Investing in the Future**

The APhA Foundation's Student Scholarship Program *awarded* 19 scholarships, including the first awarding of the Dr. Theodore G. Tong Scholarship Endowment, to student pharmacist members of APhA. Two new scholarships were created this year in memory of prominent APhA members: the Tery L. Baskin Scholarship Endowment and the Natalie M. Certo Scholarship Fund.

The APhA Foundation's Incentive Grants for Practitioner Innovation in Pharmaceutical Care <u>provided</u> 30 pharmacists and student pharmacists who are APhA members with seed funds for 2020-2021 projects. The Community Pharmacy Foundation provided matched funding, along with other funding sources.

In 2020, APhA's premier practice management award was renamed the APhA-APPM Thomas E. Menighan Pharmacy Management Excellence Award, supported by funds contributed to the APhA Foundation.

# Looking Ahead In 2020, APhA worked toward 2021 and beyond.

### **Delivering Results**

In November, APhA's Board of Trustees approved a 2021-2023 strategic plan centered on the themes of advocacy, member engagement, and practice transformation.

In 2021, APhA will embark on a new strategic agenda that includes preserving the testing and immunizing authorities the federal government granted pharmacists during the public health emergency, as well as the pursuit of other authorities necessary to meet our patients' and communities' needs; conquering inequalities that affect our patients and our profession; and ensuring that pharmacists' well-being and patients' safety are prioritized over volume and speed.

Our agenda also includes securing reimbursement for pharmacistprovided services for Medicare Part B beneficiaries at the federal level and for beneficiaries of public and private plans at the state level; and advancing payment reform that sustains patient access to pharmacy products and services. We'll also unveil enhanced engagement structures to keep our members connected, supported, and active.

This year, APhA positioned senior leadership to enhance collaborations with our state affiliates and expand our international reach. And we proudly <u>announced</u> the formation of our inaugural Hospital and Health System Strategy Council.

### Developing Pharmacy Profiles and ADVANCE<sup>®</sup>

APhA continued to invest in building the infrastructure our profession needs to demonstrate the credentials pharmacists have achieved and to facilitate workforce development to meet emerging market needs. <u>Pharmacy Profiles</u> and <u>ADVANCE</u><sup>®</sup> position pharmacists and the pharmacy workforce to gain recognition in the changing health care system.

### **Transforming Our Online Presence**

The next generation of pharmacist.com is slated to launch in early 2021—with a newly designed and lean website that addresses member usability using agile, modern technology. We also are set to unveil a new learning management system that's mobile friendly and offers a better user experience and automated internal processes.

# Planning Future Annual Meetings

We are holding APhA2021 as an entirely virtual conference on March 12-15, 2021. APhA2022 is scheduled for March 18-21, 2022, in San Antonio, TX.
